Yet during his seemingly lawless reign in the CIA, he also proved himself to be a formidable adversary to our nation's enemies, acquiring a mythic stature within the CIA that continues to this day.

Karpal Singh is widely regarded as Malaysia's best criminal and constitutional lawyer.
