This helpless and hopeless love, he feels, is what he is, even as it prevents him from ever seeing Laide for who she is. Because Who is she? is the question at the heart of Buzzati's clear-eyed and darkly comic tale of infatuation. Is A Love Affair a love story or is

it a story of anything but love? Buzzati's novel, with its psychological subtleties, vivid cityscapes, unsettling comedy, and compassion, keeps the reader guessing till the end.

I protagonisti, Franco Nero e Claudia Cardinale, cambieranno per sempre la vita del quattordicenne Luca che s'innamora perdutamente della splendida attrice. Quattrocento colpi, cento passi... Tenerezza, malinconia, gusto dell'avventura in un incantevole romanzo di formazione. Nell'estate del 1967 le Civette invadono Partinico. In questo paesone siciliano tormentato dallo scirocco vive Luca, un ragazzo di quattordici anni che odia i libri, la scuola e lo studio. Le sue uniche passioni, in una realtà senza stimoli, sogni e illusioni, sono il flipper e il calcio giocato in un campo spelacchiato conteso dai Mezzocuore,

giovani semi-umani e malfamati guidati dal mostruoso Saverio, chiamato Maciste. Contro questi selvaggi si battono Luca e la banda dei Signorini del quartiere bene capitanati dal carismatico e affascinante Sasà. Sembra un'estate come tante, lineare e rassicurante, ma improvvisamente arriva la troupe di Damiano Damiani a girare un film con un cast stellare: Il giorno della civetta. Ci sono Franco Nero e, soprattutto, la perla del cinema italiano, la bellissima Claudia Cardinale. Luca se ne innamora perdutamente e non riesce a staccarsene. Il volo delle Civette è una scossa ad alta tensione per Partinico: le gonne delle ragazze si accorciano, i capelli degli studenti si allungano, gli affari dei commercianti esplodono, la mafia rimane a guardare fino a quando u Signuruzzu, il vecchio boss religiosissimo e anacoreta, scopre il vero tema del film. Entra in scena Liborio, un perditempo giocatore di carte, al quale viene affidato il compito di sequestrare Franco Nero. Luca scopre il piano e sogna di sventarlo per ritardare la partenza della Cardinale con la quale ha intrecciato un rapporto tenero, intenso, pieno di pulsioni erotiche adolescenziali. La storia, raccontata da Luca quarant'anni dopo, rimane in bilico tra il sogno e i fatti realmente accaduti. Il razzismo sociale tra i giovani che si combattono a colpi di pietra e bastoni ha un esito impreveduto. La mafia soffoca la speranza che un nuovo mondo e un'esistenza alternativa possano esistere. Ma un ragazzo, incantato dalle Civette e da una splendida giovane donna, getta lo sguardo oltre il muro, scoprendo un orizzonte diverso e Leonardo Sciascia.

Il capitano Bellodi è un "continentale"(2), proveniente dall'Emilia, si trova in servizio in Sicilia e viene dunque confrontato con una realtà diversa, a lui nuova, complessa di un'isola dalla storia millenaria e con il mistero di numerosi delitti a cui il lettore sarà partecipe. Seguendo il capitano nella sua indagine, il lettore viene coinvolto in due dimensioni di ricerca: primo nell'individuazione dei colpevoli, per la quale è necessario di trovare le prove d'accusa a carico dei personaggi implicati. E secondo la scoperta della cultura e degli atteggiamenti dei siciliani. Anche la narrazione viene condotta su due piani, quello dell'inchiesta da parte delle forze dell'ordine e quello delle complicità che subentrano per fermarla o vanificarla. In questo modo sospetti, intuizioni e piccoli indizi attirano l'interesse e l'attenzione del lettore e nello stesso tempo le rendono inquieto perché questo tipo di narrativa del poliziesco è carica di allusioni che coinvolgono il lettore in interrogativi che dalla dimensione testuale continuamente rimandano alla realtà storica. L'invenzione e storia, intrigo poliziesco e elementi della realtà sociale e politica del nostro tempo si mescolano dunque in questo famoso romanzo "giallo" in cui l'autore modifica il personaggio tradizionale del poliziotto che consegna alla legge i malfattori, all'interno di una indagine che porta paradossalmente verso una

The first extended analysis of the relationship between Italian criminology and crime fiction in English, *Methods of Murder* examines works by major authors both popular, such as Gianrico Carofiglio, and canonical, such as Carlo Emilio Gadda. Many scholars have argued that detective fiction did not exist in Italy until 1929, and that the genre, which was considered largely Anglo-Saxon, was irrelevant on the Italian peninsula. By contrast, *Past* traces the roots of the twentieth-century literature and cinema of crime to two much earlier, diverging interpretations of the criminal: the bodiless figure of Cesare Beccaria's Enlightenment-era *On Crimes and Punishments*, and the biological offender of Cesare Lombroso's positivist *Criminal Man*. Through her examinations of these texts, *Past* demonstrates the links between literary, philosophical, and scientific constructions of the criminal, and provides the basis for an important reconceptualization of Italian crime fiction.

The Sicilian Mafia, or Cosa Nostra, is one of the most intriguing criminal phenomena in the world.
