He was the eldest son of Maharaja Kesava Varma and Maharani Susheela of Avanti kingdom The name of Raja Bhartruhari is widely known in India, as the name of the king who has renounced his throne, of became an ascetic. The dramatic story of his renunciation traditionally was one of the favorite themes of the ballads sung by the wondering minstrels and performed by the folk theaters all over India. His younger brother legendary king Vikramāditya ruled his kingdom after his renunciation Bhartrihari was a versatile genius. His work Vakyapadiya proves him of be a

grammarian as well as a philosopher. He ruled the entire Bharata Khanda and strictly followed Rajadharma and ruled 135 years with Dharma. His Maharani Padmakshi led his other 130 wives and propagated 64 Kalas (Indian Arts) 14 Vidyas (Techniques) in every corner of Bharata Khanda. He ensured that all his 130 queens held a most elevated position, and they strictly followed the Sanatana Dharma that benefited of all subjects. 130 kingdoms have long dreamt of a Greater India.
