It is a refreshingly offbeat comedy about young Max Fish, a precocious pupil at a conservative private school. He is a live wire, a teenager full of madcap entrepreneurial schemes that usually end in failure. His personal life becomes similarly complicated when he falls for his elegant teacher, Rosemary Cross, and finds himself vying for her favor with Herman Blume—who is portrayed in the film by Bill Murray—the wealthy father of two of his classmates. Max ultimately proves himself a figure of some tenacity as he negotiates the minefield of love, desire, and adolescence. Synthesizes the empirical literature on organizational structuring to answer the question of how organizations structure themselves --how they resolve needed coordination and division of labor. Organizational structuring is defined as the sum total of the ways in which an organization divides and coordinates its labor into distinct tasks. Further analysis of the research literature is needed in order to build a conceptual framework that will fill in the significant gap left by not connecting a description of structure to its context: how an organization actually functions. The results of the synthesis are five basic configurations (the Simple Structure, the Machine Bureaucracy, the Professional Bureaucracy, the Divisionalized Form, and the Adhocracy) that serve as the fundamental elements of structure in an organization. Five basic parts of the contemporary organization (the operating core, the strategic apex, the middle line, the technostructure, and the support staff), and five theories of how it functions (i.e., as a system characterized by formal authority, regulated flows, informal communication, work constellations, and ad hoc decision processes) are theorized. Organizations function in complex and varying ways, due to differing flows -including flows of authority, work material, information, and decision processes. These flows depend on the age, size, and environment of the organization; additionally, technology plays a key role because of its importance in structuring the operating core. Finally, design parameters are described - based on the above five basic parts and five theories - that are used as a means of coordination and division of labor in designing organizational structures, in order to establish stable patterns of behavior. Beware of Pity, the only novel he published during his lifetime, uncovers the seed of selfishness within even the finest of feelings. The surroundings are glamorous, wine flows freely, and the exhilarated young Hofmiller asks his host's lovely daughter for a dance, only to discover that sickness has left her painfully crippled. It is a minor blunder that will destroy his life, as pity and guilt gradually implicate him in a well-meaning but tragically wrongheaded plot to restore the unhappy invalid to health.
