He tried to

connect his own work with the cultural manifestations of the time: firstly under the influence of Colin Rowe and his formalist studies; secondly, by re-interpreting Chomsky's linguistic theories; in the 80's, by collaborating with Derrida and his de-constructivist approach; more recently by discovering Henri Bergson's idea of Time. Taking a multi-disciplinary approach based on the

intersections between architecture and philosophy, this book investigates all these definitions and, in doing so, provides new insights into and a deeper understanding of the complexity of Eisenman's work.

Can architecture help us find our place and way in today's complex world? Can it return individuals to a whole, to a

responsibility to community; but its ethical function is inevitably also political. He concludes by examining these seemingly paradoxical functions. Goodman's  
thought is  
particularly  
attractive  
because of its  
constructive  
aspect: there  
is not a given  
and  
immutable  
world, but  
both  
knowledge  
and reality are  
constantly  
built and  
rebuilt.  
Whereas other  
theories, such  
as  
deconstructio  
n, implicitly  
entail an  
undoing of  
modern  
precepts,  
Goodman's  
conception of  
world-making

offers a positive, constructive way to understand how a plural reality is made and remade. Goodman's approach to architecture is not only relevant thinking in providing new insights to understanding the built environment, but serves also as an

illustration of analytical thinking in architecture. This book shows that the methods, concepts, and ways of arguing characteristic of analytical philosophy are helpful tools to examine buildings in a novel and fruitful way and they will certainly enhance the architect's

critical skills when designing and thinking about architecture.
