Illustrator Linda Bleck began her artistic career as a child, drawing on rolls of old blueprint paper supplied by her architect father. Later, she helped her mother, a freelance illustrator for Hallmark, paint in the details of her intricate drawings. Linda's work has appeared in *The New Yorker*, *Time Magazine*, and *the Wall Street Journal*. She is also the writer and illustrator of the "Pepper the Dog" series, which won the National Parenting Publication Award.
