After 1960, Lee retreated from public life to her hometown of Monroeville, Alabama.

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Irony in *To Kill a Mockingbird*. Authors just love to use irony in their literature. Irony is when the opposite of what we expect to happen occurs. There are three types of irony: verbal, dramatic, and situational. Verbal irony occurs when characters say one thing, but there is really another meaning to their words.

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In the book, *To Kill a Mockingbird*, Harper Lee tells the reader about the people living in Maycomb County. Throughout the three years we follow these characters; we see how they interact with each other and learn how love and hate are complex emotions.
